MYEP Earns PCE Accreditation

We are thrilled to announce that MYEP has achieved Person-Centered Excellence (PCE) Accreditation from the Council on Quality and Leadership (CQL). This milestone underscores our commitment to providing exceptional person-centered services. The accreditation visit took place from November 12th-15th, 2024.

The PCE Accreditation recognizes our dedication to enhancing the lives of those we support with choice, opportunity, and respect. Key areas discussed during accreditation included:

Donna has been with MYEP all the way back to 2013. Her recent promotion into a Residential Service Coordinator role provides a great opportunity to feature her in this spotlight so everyone can get to know her a little better.

When Donna started with MYEP back in May of 2013 she first accepted a DSP position. She was in a DSP position for only a few months before she was promoted to a Lead DSP. Donna's ambitions were quickly recognized; she came with experience, drive, and the right mindset. It was in the Lead DSP position where Donna made her mark. She quickly became known and respected for her uncompromising standards for the high quality service provision, and high professional standards for herself and her team. Donna became the expert. After high-school I got my CNA and started working in retirement homes. This was in New Orleans where I was born and raised and stayed until moving to lowa in 2000. I came to

be closer to family in Chicago but didn't want to be in the city. I tried it here and loved it. My first job in lowa was working direct care at REM. Then I did a little bit of everything, worked for the Department of Human Services and then landed here at MYEP.

What are a couple of your professional goals over the next 5 years?

Getting more comfortable in my new role. Excelling in it and being as good as I can.

What is your favorite aspect of the MYEP culture?

Person-centered living. Allowing each person to have their voice heard and their wants and needs respected.

What is a fun fact about you that may surprise people?

I'm not as quiet as I'm sometimes known to be. Once I'm fully comfortable I let loose and my friends and family have to tell me to stop talking so much.

If you could travel anywhere, where would you go and why? Paris! I keep hearing they have the best wine.

Resilience Personified.

Talking to most people these days, you hear about the rollercoaster they feel like they've been on with all of the chaos and change in the world around us. Talking to Sauve you'd be more likely to hear about the small parts of his daily life that bring him joy, not about the chaos and hardship. Those who know Sauve well, though, understand and are proud to talk about the major life battles he has faced over the past few years with outstanding resilience and strength.

I recently sat down with Sauve and talked about how he navigated his journey with cancer and loss. In October 2021 Sauve was diagnosed with lymphoma. Sauve shared that his dad was the first person he remembers thinking something was wrong. Sauve went to spend a weekend with his dad in Des Moines and when they went out for Chinese food Sauve didn't want to eat. Sauve remembers his dad saying that if he didn't want Chinese food, he must be really sick. It was shortly after this visit Sauve remembers learning at an appointment that he was diagnosed with cancer.

Sauve persevered through long appointments. There were challenging phases of the treatments that left him nauseous, tired, and without his regular appetite. During his cancer battle, Sauve received the crushing news that his dad had suffered a heart attack and unexpectedly passed away. Sauve remembers his dad as the coolest person he has ever known. Sauve says that losing him was really hard, but it makes him happy that he still spends time with his sister. The loss of a parent is devastating. This type of loss coupled with a major health battle could be enough to push anybody into a place of darkness. Sauve exemplified taking one day at a time, step by step. Sauve battled through all of the day-to-day challenges to emerge on

the other side. It wasn't a short battle or an easy battle. Finally in November of 2024 Sauve was officially declared cancer-free!

Despite these hardships it is clear that Sauve has not lost his feisty, spirited approach to life. When asked about what carried him through the difficult times it always comes back to his joy of the small things driving his determination. Since Sauve began living with supports through MYEP in 2009 he has been known for his larger-than-life smile and his infectious excitement. Small things can spark an energetic burst of pure energy and excitement that many times sends Sauve bounding across a room. Small things that get him going include hearing or telling funny jokes, seeing an old friend, a compliment on a new pair of sneakers, and a favorite song blasting at a party.

Sauve will tell you some of his favorite ways to spend his time include walking to nearby parks, time with his sister, watching airplanes and daydreaming of jet-setting to Las Vegas with a girlfriend. When asked what he would like to do more of and who he would like to spend more time with he comes right back to wanting more of the small things that bring him daily joy. Sauve mentions admiring Robert and Dido who are present and supportive men in his life and looking forward to putting up a basketball hoop at his house this spring and shooting hoops together. Sauve mentions his love for good food and going out to eat. Sauve says he's excited about a hockey game and a rodeo he has plans to attend.

Whether intentional or not, Sauve's approach to putting a few of your favorite things on the top of the mountain ahead of you is admirable. The self-pride and wisdom Sauve gained from getting through some really tough challenges is magnetic.

2024 Highlights

A Monumental Shift:

Transforming Lives from Glenwood Resource Center to MYEP Residential Program

After more than 150 years of service, the Glenwood Resource Center (GRC) in Iowa has closed its doors. This state-run facility, which provided care for individuals with severe intellectual disabilities, faced significant challenges and controversies in recent years, leading to its closure on June 30, 2024. As the center shut down, six long-term residents embarked on a new journey, transitioning into the MYEP Residential Program in Iowa City.

The Glenwood Resource Center has a long history, dating back to its establishment in the 19th century. Over the years, it housed individuals with various disabilities, providing them with care and support. However, in recent years, the facility faced scrutiny due to allegations of mistreatment and inadequate care. Federal investigations revealed significant issues, prompting state officials to announce the closure of GRC in 2022.

As GRC prepared to close, the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) worked diligently to relocate its residents. Among them were six individuals who had spent most of their lives at GRC. These individuals transitioned into

the MYEP Residential Program, a community-based service in lowa City that offers person-centered support for adults with disabilities.

The MYEP Residential Program provides a supportive and inclusive environment for adults with disabilities. The program focuses on community integration, socialization, and self-advocacy, helping residents build life skills and foster meaningful relationships. Each resident receives personalized support based on their unique needs and goals, ensuring a smooth transition from institutional care to a more independent living arrangement.

The transition from GRC to MYEP was not without its challenges. Many of the individuals had spent decades in an institutional setting, making the adjustment to a new environment difficult. However, with the dedicated support of MYEP staff, these individuals gradually adapted to their new homes. The program's emphasis on community involvement and personalized care played a crucial role in helping them feel comfortable and secure.









Reinventing Quality Conference
